## Centering Youth Voices: Roundtable Discussion Struggles for Justice and Peace in Our World

Moderated by Duaa Mohamed, Mastercard Foundation

A powerful roundtable discussion that brought together voices of marginalized youth from South Sudan, Sudan, Syria, Uganda and the Democratic Republic of the Congo—youth whose lives have been shaped by ongoing conflict and displacement. Through their stories, we honor youth resilience, resistance, and the pursuit of justice. As part of our growing global movement for and by conscious young leaders, this session creates space for freedom of expression, shared learning, and collective reflection—centering dignity, humanity, and solidarity in what it means to strive for justice and peace in turbulent times. Participants explored conscious leadership and global solidarity as pathways to understanding our shared struggles for justice and to building a more peaceful and equitable world.



## Storytelling as a Civic Practice

A Storytelling Watch Party wove individual experience with collective imagination. Here, narratives were tools for reshaping meaning, forging empathy, and reconfiguring what leadership looks like in a world longing for compassion, clarity, and courage.

This practice resonates with the movement's focus on storytelling as a fundamental capacity for changemakers.



## DAY 2 HIGHLIGHTS



## Plenary Provocation Inclusivity as Our Compass: A Guided Reflection led by Women, Indigenous Youth, Displaced Youth, and Youth with Disabilities

Participants were invited to imagine higher education systems where inclusion is not symbolic, but intentional—embedded in how spaces are designed, voices are heard, and leadership is practiced. Through guided conversations, participants shared unmet needs, expectations, and opportunities within their universities and communities grounded in their lived experiences.

## Youth-led Innovation & Ethical AI: Values Guiding Technology



This session spotlighted how the *For Youth, By Youth* movement is shaping inclusive and ethical AI through innovation, collaboration, and youth leadership. Participants shared three milestone outcomes: the YouthIN AI Mentor Chatbot, the Impact Dashboard, and a Policy Brief on Ethical and Inclusive AI. Together, these tools illustrate how young leaders are transforming ethical principles into practical solutions that promote inclusion, accountability, and social impact.



# CO-CREATING THE MOVEMENT CHARTER:

## Shared Values, Shared Responsibility

Participants came together in guided dialogue to co-create the *For Youth, By Youth* Movement Charter — a shared foundation rooted in collective values, accountability, and belonging. The session clarified how participation translates into meaningful opportunity, aligned the Charter with the Declaration on the Future of Higher Education, and shaped a shared, accessible language that connects community action to institutional and professional pathways.

## CENTERING HEALTH, WELLNESS AND CARE






# CHAMPIONING GLOBAL YOUTH ENGAGEMENT
