The Talloires Network of Engaged Universities celebrates Tufts University President Tony Monaco's 8-year tenure as Steering Committee Chair. Members of the Talloires Network community and a host of educational and civic leaders around the world have shared personal reflections and memories of his leadership of the Network.

Dear Tony,

Thank you for your service as Chair to the Talloires Network Steering Committee. You are an exceptional and visionary leader whose contributions to higher education will endure.

It has been an honor to serve by your side as Vice-Chair of the Talloires Network Steering Committee. I will treasure fond memories of working with you and our colleagues at the Tisch College of Civic Life during extremely challenging times. At the height of the global Covid-19 pandemic, the Network provided support for community-university collaboration and student leadership in regions around the world. COV-AID (Communities Of Virtual Alliance & Inter-Dependence) allowed Universidad Camilo José Cela (UCJC) and other Network member institutions to share best practices for pandemic management and foster lasting partnerships. Additionally, the Next Generation Leaders Program offered essential support to university students who were struggling to adjust to new realities. I remain inspired by young leaders like UCJC's Khan Alkozee –a student of Law and Criminology– who met regularly with peers around the globe to chart the strategic direction for the Network. The voices and perspectives of Next Generation Leaders were the highlight of the 2021 Talloires Network Leaders Conference, co-hosted by Tufts University and Harvard University.

Societies are changing a great deal. Within this period of rapid and profound transformation, the Network's role in the higher education sector is more vital than ever before. Congruent with the values and principles of the 2005 Talloires Declaration, I too believe universities "should use the processes of education and research to respond to, serve and strengthen its communities for local and global citizenship." The main agents at universities are the students, and we are wise to listen to them.

Too many of us to name are appreciative for your steadfast commitment to the Network as you have contributed intellectually and financially to the strength of the Network. From negotiating the addition of two student seats on the Steering Committee in 2014, to overseeing three global conferences, to forging new partnerships that allow less well-endowed universities to participate in this crucial work – your creative and bold leadership is an example to us all.

I am humbled by the opportunity to serve as the next Chair of the Steering Committee and look forward to building on the strong foundation set by the prior Chairs, including Larry Bacow, Mark Gearan, and yourself.




Chau Au Student University of Technology Sydney (Australia)

Thank you for your profound influence on the evolution of the Talloires Network – your active involvement has fundamentally altered the DNA of our living, growing, and dynamic global coalition.

Tony, I recall vividly the summer morning in July 2014 when we met in Ballou Hall to discuss the future of the Talloires Network and your possible role as the Steering Committee Chair. The Steering Committee had nominated you to run for the position. You were thoughtful and clear, as is your way. While you valued the Network's direct involvement of university presidents, vice-chancellors, and rectors, you suggested the Network shine a brighter light on university students, faculty, and community partners. You described your vision as a "blending front line people with heads of universities."

Several months later, you participated in the Talloires Network Leaders Conference in Cape Town, South Africa, where you led a strategic planning meeting with Network Steering Committee members. You advocated for the addition of student representatives to the Steering Committee, emphasizing the importance of placing student voices and perspectives at the forefront of the Network. Following a robust deliberation, the Committee decided to revise its rules of governance to include two seats for university student leaders at the decision-making table. This experiment has proven successful as evidenced by the testimonies of young people around the world who have flourished during your tenure.

Your impactful contributions are too many to name here. Highlights include: putting down a marker in 2015 to change the global university ranking systems to include more elements of civic engagement; creating an Engaged Membership system of shared ownership to sustain Network operations in 2016; participating in the 2017 Talloires Network Leaders Conference in Veracruz, Mexico; convening engaged universities in the United Kingdom in 2018 and 2019; and demonstrating by example how engaged universities can respond effectively to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. During this tumultuous period, the 2021 Talloires Network Leaders Conference –co-hosted by Tufts University and Harvard University– brought together more than 1,400 higher education leaders in 53 countries, and more than one-third of the conference sessions were organized and led by students around the world.

Tony, you are beloved by many around the world. We are tremendously grateful for your deep commitment to the well-being of others and for your personal investment in our collective mission. We want you to know that your legacy as Chair will live on through the relationships, ideas, and programs that you have generously and tirelessly supported. Though it cannot be seen or measured, we know the qualities of your multidimensional leadership –humility, intelligence, humor, kindness, courage– will be passed down through the Network for generations to come.
